

Making History a subject to remember



The Hunger Games is an action-packed science-fiction trilogy based on Suzanne Collins' novel published in 2008. It portrays an unspecified future where the protagonist, Katniss, voluntarily takes her younger sister's place in the Hunger Games: a televised competition in which two teenagers from each of the twelve Districts of Panem are chosen at random to fight to the death.

The film takes place in the postapocalyptic nation of Panem, located in North America. The country consists of twelve (originally thirteen) poor districts ruled by a wealthy Capitol city. The Capitol is rich and technologically advanced, but the districts are in varying states of poverty. The protagonist and narrator, Katniss Everdeen, lives in District 12, the poorest region of Panem. As punishment for a past rebellion against the Capitol, a boy and a girl from each of the twelve remaining districts, are selected at random to compete in an annual pageant called the Hunger Games. The Games are a televised event in which the participants, are forced to fight

to the death in a dangerous arena. The winning tribute and his or her home district are then rewarded with food, supplies, and riches.

In my opinion, The Hunger Games can be considered relevant to teenage audiences, mostly because most of the characters are teenagers. Also, it shows how teens confront difficulties while slowly entering the grown-ups' world. There are some scenes that can be considered intensively violent, but I think it isn't as disturbing as other films.

Katniss, the protagonist and narrator of the trilogy, can be a powerful role model for young people, especially for young girls. She is portrayed as a brave, determined and intelligent person who took her sisters place in a deadly competition without hesitation and managed to survive twice.

To sum up, any teenager who enjoys an adventurous film with strong characters will definitely appreciate The Hunger Games, which presents realistically our society's financial and social differences.

At even its simplest, The Fault In Our Stars can be a wake-up call to some preteens and, of course, adults as well that you never quite know the struggles the people around you are going through. Don't be cruel. Maybe seeing a girl your age with a nasal cannula, a boy with a prosthetic leg, or a blind boy behind sunglasses after this book will cause people to look at them with empathy, instead of as "other." Maybe they'll choose to be kind, to befriend, rather than to push aside or worse, bully

Hazel spends so much of her live in a self-imposed bubble, pretending everything is fine to protect those around her. But this is the wrong idea, and she learns it. Your friends and family are put here to help you, so engage with them. Speak your fears, as Augustus does, and cry it out, egg cars, and break things, as Isaac does. You don't always have to put up a facade; let others in to help when you're going through something.

Words can't explain how much I wish I had this book when I was a preteen, coping with my own illness. For others who are struggling with the same diagnosis or congenital disease, it can truly teach us all to remember that, while an illness becomes a piece of who you are, it does not define you. And you know what? You can do this.

And for those who are lucky enough to have a healthy childhood, the novel can teach you to remember to never pigeonhole people, to allow them to open up and show you their whole person, behind the disease.

How many times have you heard, "but it's not fair!" from someone in your life? The Fault in our Stars doesn't put it gently: Guess what, the world isn't fair. If you're playing along thinking it'll be fair, you have the wrong scorecard. But there's still hope and that's a crucial message, one that isn't all positive or all negative, of the story that really, we shouldn't let our middle schoolers miss. And if you think some of them aren't already learning this in the course of their own lives and you're helping them by shutting out the negativity, you're so, so wrong.

Every step of the way, Augustus and Hazel's plans were foiled. Their trip to Amsterdam to meet their favorite author; the rollercoasters of their illnesses; and even Isaac dealt with it with his breakup. But ultimately, this isn't always a bad thing, and it's a tough lesson to learn for everyone. No matter how much you plan ahead, the universe doesn't have a copy of your calendar.

What could be a better lesson than reminding the middle schoolers that their actions and words impact people's lives, for better or for worse. It's a not-sogentle nudge to remind people to look outside themselves, to be kind to friends, to treat others as they'd want to be treated. As



Hazel said, and as Gus learned, you don't have to be world famous, the best kind of love is to be a good person and a good friend. And in the end, that's what will make the difference.

The Fault in our Stars is a huge reminder that, even when you're a teenager, you are not immortal. With that in mind, get out there in the world and experience it. Travel, feel, love. Appreciate the small moments. Don't get bogged down in the minutia, because it won't matter next year, or even tomorrow. Don't be afraid of heartbreak or struggle, because look, that's inevitable and a part of life. You never know what the world has coming for you, so go out and make things happen.

Greek Easter Traditions

For Greeks, Easter is the biggest religious holiday of the year. Today in Greece, Easter celebrations have a direct connection with the Orthodox faith. Preparation for Easter begins with Kathara Deutera (Clean Monday), which is the first day of lent. During lent, which lasts for forty days before Easter, one is not supposed to eat anything that comes from animals. Basically, that means no meat, fish, milk, cheese and egg. The big week, or as it is known in Greek 'Megali Evdomada,' is the week from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. On Thursday Greek Easter bread called tsoureki is baked and the traditional red Easter eggs are dyed. On Friday you?ll hear the church bells ring all day for the funeral of Christ. The Bible said that he died in the ninth hour, and at nine o?clock Greeks follow a symbolic funeral procession. Many people participate in the quiet procession while carrying candles. Saturday is the last day of lent and it is filled with preparations for the midnight meal, including a traditional soup called magiritsa. Just before midnight on Saturday everyone gathers at church with their Easter candles. And then the big moment! Just before midnight all the lights are switched off, and a moment later the priest announces 'Christos Anesti, or Christ Has Risen. People start cheering,

greeting and kissing each other, and many fireworks go off. Everyone carries candles with them to be lit by the priest's candle which represents the 'holy flame.' The tradition is that representatives from the Greek Orthodox church have transported to Greece a candle lit by the eternal burning flame at the Church of the holy Grave in Jerusalem, and the flame is spread from candle to candle all over Greece. Each person carefully carries their lit candle home in order to bless their home by drawing a cross with the flame above the entrance for protection from all evil. Many Greek homes will keep the flame burning in a traditional 'kandili' until the following Easter. And then the feast begins! The 'tsougrisma' game begins where people break each other's red eggs by hitting them against each other. The one with the strongest egg is said the have good luck for the whole year! The first meal after lent is usually the traditional Easter soup called magiritsa, eaten after church on Saturday night. On Easter Sunday family and friends gather for a big Easter meal, which typically includes roasted lamb, and loads of different salads.

CHRISTMAS COOKIES

3 ¾ cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder ½ teaspoon salt 1 cup margarine, softened 1½ cups white sugar 2 eggs 2 teaspoons vanilla extract



STEP 1

Sift flour, baking powder, and salt together, set aside. In a large bowl, cream together the margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs one at a time, then stir in the vanilla. Gradually blend in the sifted ingredients until fully absorbed. Cover dough, and chill for 2 hours.

STEP 2

Preheat oven to 200 degrees C. Grease cookie sheets. On a clean floured surface, roll out small portions of chilled dough to 0,5 cm thickness. Cut out shapes using cookie cutters.

STEP 3

Bake 6 to 8 minutes in the preheated oven, or until edges are barely brown. Remove from cookie sheets to cool on wire racks.
